## SAF GATHERING RECAP

In 1905, Albert Einstein developed the complex theory of relativity. His equation (E=MC<sup>2</sup>) states, a mass (M) can be converted into an amount of energy (E), where  $C^2$  is the speed of light squared. During the spiritual part of our February Fraternity Gathering, we pondered and discussed a unique "spiritual" formula for "total Secular Franciscan conversion" promoted by Deacon Tom Bello, OFS in his book "For All the Saints: St. Francis's Five Point Plan for Salvation". His formula was: "Conversion times Three" (or Total C = C times 3). The term "conversion" is defined by the Gospel as "a radical daily change of our thoughts and deeds to those of Christ". As Secular Franciscans, we are called to pursue especially during Lent: (1) our own personal conversion, (2) conversion of our fraternity, and (3) conversion of the world that we live in. Many thanks to Gerry Rohrkemper, OFS who



effectively led our Conversion times Three session. Our guest for this Gathering was **Frances Cunzeman** who recently moved from out of state to St. Bernadette Parish. She was referred to SAF by Father Chris.

#### HOLY LIFE, HOLY DEATH: A LOOK BACK AT SOLANUS CASEY

Throughout his life, but especially, as one would expect, toward the end, **Blessed Solanus Casey's**, **O.F.M.Cap** thoughts turned more and more to death and to how life relates to death. His statements on this subject show a remarkable familiarity, even friendliness, with death, which well reflect the words of his spiritual father **Saint Francis of Assisi**, who prayed in his Canticle of Brother Sun, "**Be praised**, **my Lord, for our Sister Bodily Death, from whom no one living can escape.**"

"Many are the rainbows," Solanus wrote in a letter to his brother Edward, "the sunbursts, the gentle breezes —and the hailstorms we are liable to meet before, by the grace of God, we shall be able to tumble into our graves with the confidence of tired children into their places of peaceful slumber."

He had written, "**Death can be beautiful...if we make it so.**" How? A passage from another letter answers this question: "Let us thank God ahead of time for whatever He foresees is pleasing to Him,... leaving everything at His divine disposal, including—with all its circumstances, when, where, and how—God may be pleased to dispose the events of our death."

As he had throughout his whole life and ministry, Solanus was offering himself in order to bring others to God. His words sum up his life: "I looked on my whole life as giving, and I want to give until there is



nothing left of me to give. So I prayed that, when I come to die, I might be perfectly conscious, so that with a deliberate act I can give my last breath to God."

God answered his prayer, for at the moment of his death, on July 31, 1957, Solanus suddenly opened his

eyes, reached out his arms and said: **"I give my soul** to Jesus Christ." He died fifty-three years to the hour after his first Mass as a priest in Appleton, Wisconsin. The perfect self-offering of his earthly life was complete.

# **"THE RETURN OF THE PRODIGAL SON: A STORY OF HOMECOMING"**

This book is a very popular read during Lent and is written by **Henri J.M Nouwen**, a Dutch Catholic priest, professor, writer and theologian.



A chance encounter with a reproduction of Rembrandt's *The Return of the Prodigal Son* catapulted Henri Nouwen on a long spiritual adventure that led him to discover the place within where God has chosen to dwell.

In seizing the inspiration that came to him through Rembrandt's depiction of the

powerful Gospel story, Henri Nouwen probes the several movements of the parable: the younger son's return, the father's restoration of sonship, the elder son's vengefulness, and the father's compassion. In his reflection on Rembrandt in light of his own life journey, the author evokes the powerful drama of the parable in a rich captivating way that is sure to reverberate in the hearts of the readers. **The themes of homecoming, affirmation, and reconciliation will be newly discovered by all who have known loneliness, dejection, jealousy or anger.** The challenge to love as the father and be loved as the son will be seen as the ultimate revelation of the parable known to Christians throughout time, and in this inspiring book represented with a vigor and power, fresh for our times.

**From the author:** *"When, four years ago, I went to Saint Petersburg to see Rembrandt's painting, I had little idea how much I would have to live what I then saw. I stand in awe at the place where Rembrandt brought me. He led me from the kneeling, disheveled young son to the standing, bent-over old father, from the place of being blessed to the place of blessing.* 

As I look at my own aging hands, I know that they have been given to me to stretch out toward all who suffer, to rest upon the shoulders of all who come, and to offer the blessings that emerges from the immensity of God's love."

## ST. JOSEPH, FOSTER FATHER AND LOVING HUSBAND



St. Joseph of the House of David was the husband of Mary, of whom was born Jesus the Christ. God entrusted his two greatest treasures, Jesus and Mary, to the care and protection of St. Joseph. St. Joseph was the foster-father of Jesus and

along with the Virgin Mary spent the most earthly hours with Jesus during his childhood. The most reliable information on St. Joseph is from the Infancy Narratives of the Gospels of Saints Matthew and Luke.

Joseph was betrothed to Mary, but before they came together, she was with child by the Holy Spirit. Being a "just man" and unwilling to put her to shame, he planned to send her away quietly. But he was warned in a dream by an angel of the Lord: "Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary your wife, for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit; she will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their

#### sins" (Matthew 1:18-21).

While his family was originally from Bethlehem, St. Joseph settled in Nazareth where he was a carpenter by trade



(Matthew 13:55). He took Mary his espoused wife from Nazareth to Bethlehem for a census where she delivered the baby Jesus. Following the birth of Jesus and the visit of the Magi, Joseph was again warned in a dream by an angel of the Lord to escape the wrath of Herod; he took the Holy Family on the Flight to Egypt. They stayed there until the death of Herod, when Joseph was again directed in a dream by an angel of the Lord to leave Egypt, avoid Judea, and return to Nazareth (Matthew 2:19-23).

When Jesus was twelve years old, his parents took him to Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, and, after missing him for three days, they found him in the Temple, sitting in the midst of the teachers. Mary was astonished and said to him, "Your father and I have been looking for you." Jesus answered, "Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" But they did not understand what he said to them. He was obedient to them and returned to Nazareth. "And Jesus advanced in wisdom and age and favor before God and man" (Luke 2:48-52).

Joseph is referenced in relation to Jesus in **John 1:45**, when Philip found Nathanael and told him: "We have found the one about whom Moses wrote in the Law, and also the prophets, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." He is also referenced in **John 6:42** in relation to Jesus: "Is this not Jesus, the son of Joseph?"

Jesus was obedient to Joseph, his Guardian on earth (Luke 2:51). Does not Jesus Christ in Heaven also listen to any request that St. Joseph makes of Him? For that reason, St. Joseph is valued as a Patron Saint for many causes. It has been claimed by many, such as St. Teresa of Avila and the Carmelites, that prayers of petition to St. Joseph to intercede with Our Lord have been answered.

The Holy Family, Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, is our best example of a loving family. Saint Joseph is the Patron Saint of Marriage. Joseph listened to the angel and accepted his divine mission by taking Mary as his wife and becoming the foster-father of Jesus.

**Bishop Fulton J. Sheen**, in *The World's First Love*, noted in a Chapter entitled "The World's Happiest Marriage," that **"no husband or wife ever loved each** 

other as much as Joseph and Mary," for they had a pure union of heart. And they lived in the presence of love itself, Jesus Christ!

The Blessed Virgin Mary serves as our model of love and mercy, who intercedes with her Son Jesus for us, her children on earth.
