Page, Treasurer, OFS. Israela Garcia, Assistant Minister, OFS graciously led this Gathering. In lieu of praying the Liturgy of the Hours, we prayed the Divine Mercy Chaplet in honor of the celebration of Divine Mercy Sunday. Israela used a handout entitled "Unlimited Mercy" which listed citations from Lamentations 3:22-23, Luke 6:36, Matthew 5:7, 1 John 1:9; Hebrews 4:16 and 1 Peter 1:3. We were requested to select the citation that most resonated with us and report the reason for their selection. Another spiritual demo compared the unlimited mercy that God gives us to water in a bowl. Using a rubber suction dropper, Israela removed water from the bowl and had her audience count each of the 16 drops of water that she squeezed from the dropper. SAF APOSTOLATE: ST. FELIX PANTRY

This article is intended to renew our Fraternal awareness and resolve to increase our SAF Gathering donations and volunteer support for the St. Felix Pantry.



The Founder and visionary of St. Felix Pantry, **Felician Sister Genevieve**, was born Julia Ryskiewicz, of Polish decent, in Mosinee, Wisconsin on June 3, 1923. There were nine children in the family with Sister Genevieve the second oldest. She moved to the new Rio

Rancho Convent in 1976. Sister Genevieve began to travel around the area to pick up day old bread from various businesses and gave the bread out of the trunk of her car.

St. Felix Pantry is a nonprofit charitable organization incorporated in 1992. For well over twenty five years, the Pantry has been a safety net for people struggling to support their families in times of crisis. The Pantry provides (free of charge) food, clothing, household items, and referral services. But people served by the Pantry need more than food, clothing, and household items; they need respect for their dignity, compassion for their suffering, hope for their children, and a place that welcomes and empowers them for their journey. These are the real gifts of the Pantry. The need for these services has grown in relationship to the economic downturn: loss of jobs, rise in food and fuel costs, and recent cutbacks in welfare and healthcare benefits. Weekly, the pantry provides food for 1,000 individuals!

"HOW CATHOLIC ART SAVED THE FAITH"

In the recent wake of flames causing colossal damage to the treasured **Notre Dame Cathedral** in Paris, there has been a new awakening not only in France but throughout the world on the importance and spiritual value of sacred art to our Catholic Faith.



A relevant book on this topic was published in 2018, written by **Elizabeth Lev**, and entitled **"How Catholic Art Saved the Faith".** A brief review follows:

Not long after Martin Luther's defiance of the Church,

dialogue between Protestants and Catholics broke down and religious wars erupted across Europe. Desperate to restore unity of Faith, Catholic theologians turned to the arts to help reaffirm Catholic doctrines. Convinced that to win over the unlettered, the best place to fight heresy was not in the streets but in stone and canvas, they enlisted the best artists to create a glorious wave of beautiful works of art — Catholic works of sacred art — to draw people together.

Here's the story of the vibrant, visual-arts SWAT team who's war cry could have been **"Art for Faith's sake!"** Over the years, it included Michelangelo, Caravaggio, Guido Reni, Annibale Carracci, Barocci, Bernini and Artemisa Gentileschi. Each of these creative souls, despite his own interior struggles, was a key player in this magnificent, generations-long project: the affirmation through beauty of the teachings of the

Holy Catholic Church. The book includes an interesting storyline about the sacred painting entitled: "St. Francis" by Federico Barocci depicting him receiving the stigmata in a tomb-like cave.



FRANCISCAN REFLECTION: ST. FRANCIS AND MARY, MOTHER OF JESUS

One of the most important figures in Christianity is Mary, the mother of Jesus. **The biographers of St. Francis explained his relationship to Mary as one of "indescribable love" because she made the Lord of majesty to be our brother.** The small chapel dedicated to Our Lady of the Angels was one of the early churches St. Francis rebuilt and was the place his order began to grow.

St. Francis' love for Mary was shown in his prayers and how he lived his life. He used Mary as a model for how he could try to follow Jesus. There were two major prayers that Francis wrote and these prayers can help us follow her example as a disciple of Jesus.

The first of these is called **"A Salutation of the Blessed Virgin Mary."**

Hail, O Lady, Holy Queen, Mary, holy Mother of God, Who are the Virgin made Church, chosen by the most Holy Father in heaven whom he consecrated with His most holy beloved Son and with the Holy Spirit the Paraclete, in whom there was and is all fullness of grace and every good. Hail, His Palace! Hail, His Tabernacle! Hail, His Dwelling! Hail, His Robe! Hail, His Servant! Hail, His Mother! And Hail, all You holy virtues which are poured into the hearts of the faithful through the grace and enlightenment of the Holy Spirit that from being unbelievers

You may make them faithful to God.

This prayer uses many titles and images to describe Mary, but the most original was when he calls her the "Virgin Made Church." **St. Francis writes that Mary has set an example of how our church and its people should be faithful and do service for others**. She is faithful to God, even though she does not know what lies ahead, and accepts the challenge by God. This sets an example for all within the church to answer God's calling. The Church started within her because she was, in a way, a tabernacle. She held the body and blood of Christ within her, protecting it similar to the tabernacle in a church.

The 2nd prayer that Francis wrote about Mary is the **Antiphon from the Office of the Passion.**

Holy Virgin Mary, among the women born into the world, there is no one like you. Daughter and servant of the most high and supreme King and of the Father in heaven,

Mother of our most Holy Lord Jesus Christ, Spouse of the Holy Spirit, pray for us with St. Michael the Archangel, all the powers of heaven and all the saints at the side of your most holy beloved Son, our Lord and Teacher.

St. Francis would have prayed this prayer numerous times a day as he was praying the psalms of the Church's Liturgy. Francis uses all these loving images to describe Mary and her relationship with God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. **Also, in his writings he often referred to her as a "holy mother" showing his love and connection.** And he built these relationships not only with Mary, but built these personal relationships with everyone and everything. A good way to understand how Francis felt about Mary is to think about how we love our own mother.

We might be surprised by how much St. Francis wrote about Mary and it really showed his love and affection for her. He showed us how to develop a deeper relationship with her in our life. Francis encourages us to be just as faithful to God as Mary. **Although we might not be tested as much as Mary, we can do the little things in life to strengthen our faith.**
